Prelude: This first song of the service is meant to prepare our minds and hearts for worship. Feel free to sing along or simply meditate as we psalm, is an invitation into the presence of God; begin our time worshiping God.

Call to Worship: We worship because we are called to do so. This call, usually taken from a to worship and praise him.

Song of Praise

Whoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy.

Prayer of Confession

followed by a time of silent confession

Eternal Father, you are good beyond all thought,

but we are sinful and blind.

Our lips are ready to confess,

but our hearts are slow to feel and our ways reluctant to amend. We bring our souls to you.

Break them, wound them, bend them, mold them.

Unmask to us sin's deformity, that we may hate it, abhor it, flee from it.

Our sins we mourn, lament, and for them cry, "Pardon."

Work in us more profound and abiding repentance;

give us the fullness of a godly grief which is ever powerful, and ever confident;

grant that our repentance will enable us to see more clearly the brightness and glory of the cross of Jesus Christ, in whose name we pray. Amen.

Prayer of Adoration: Praying is essential to worship. As we pray, we begin by adoring God for who he is and what he has done through his son Jesus. We conclude this prayer by reciting together the Lord's Prayer.

Call to Confession: As we praise God, and through the Spirit showing us, we become aware of our own imperfections in light of our perfect God. In love, God calls us to freely and openly confess our sins before him.

Confession of Sin: Sin is not only something that we've done wrong. Rather, it's a state of being that we're born into, and that we need saving from. It is impossible to conquer sin on our own, or make amends for it by our own actions. Our only hope is to turn to Christ, asking that he forgive and conquer sin for us, and - by grace alone and through faith alone - save us.

Assurance of Forgiveness Acts 10:43

To him all the prophets bear witness that everyone who believes in Christ receives forgiveness of sins through his name.

Song of Thanks Oh the Deep, Deep Love of Jesus

Oh the deep, deep love of Jesus Vast, unmeasured, boundless, free. Rolling as a mighty ocean In its fullness over me. Underneath me, all around me, Is the current of your love; Leading onward, leading homeward, To your glorious rest above.

Assurance of Forgiveness: As we confess our sin, God offers us the assurance that, in Jesus, we are forgiven and loved regardless of what we've done in the past. Because of Jesus, we are no longer condemned by our sin, but are brought into new life by the Spirit. Song of Thanks: Knowing that we are forgiven, and knowing that Jesus has reconciled us with God the Father, we sing with thankful hearts.

Profession of Faith selections from the Heidelberg Catechism

- Leader: Christians, what do you believe?
 - All: I believe that the eternal Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who out of nothing created heaven and earth and everything in them, who still upholds and rules them by his eternal counsel and providence, is my God and Father because of Christ his Son. I believe that Jesus is the Son of God and saves us from our sins even as salvation cannot be found in anyone else; it is futile to look for any salvation elsewhere. I believe that the Holy Spirit is eternal God and that He has been given to me personally, so that, by true faith, He makes me share in Christ and all his blessings, comforts me, and remains with me forever.

Profession of Faith: Either done by a corporate prayer or responsive reading, we - as a church - make use of historical creeds or prayers that summarize the foundational elements of the Christian faith. In short, it is here that we declare what it is we believe.

Sermon To Come to Jesus

Central text 1 Peter 2:4-8

⁴ As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, ⁵ you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶ For it stands in Scripture:

"Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone,

a cornerstone chosen and precious,

and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

⁷So the honor is for you who believe, but for those who do not believe,

"The stone that the builders rejected

has become the cornerstone,"

⁸and

"A stone of stumbling,

and a rock of offense."

They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do.

Sermon: Though spoken by a person, we are to hear the sermon as God speaking to us. A sermon is a study in God's Word, the announcement of the good news in Christ, and an invitation to apply the truth of God's Word to our daily lives. At Gracehill, our sermons are not generally based certain themes; rather, we study through individual books of the Bible.

Sermon Discussion Questions

1 Peter 2:4-8

- Peter reminds us that the one whom we are called to, Jesus, was rejected by men and yet chosen and honored by God. The gospel accounts show us how this calling from the Father was a sustaining comfort to Jesus throughout his life. (baptism -Mt.3:17, temptation - Mt.4:10, Gethsemane - Mt.26:39, crucifixion - Lk.23:46, Heb.12:2) How is the call of God a comfort for believers? How does God express His delight and honor towards his children? Do you have any personal examples of that?
- 2. Remember that Peter is speaking to Christians of the dispersion who were scattered because of a real exile. How would the truth that we are a "worshiping community" be encouraging to the church in diaspora? How does that encourage us today in our context?
- 3. Why is it significant that Peter uses the imagery of "living stones"? (See Matthew 16:16-18) The building project is for a God-worshiping community who is "ransomed... by the precious blood of Christ" (1Pt.1;18-19). How does the grace of the gospel impact our sacrifice as living stones?
- 4. This passage contrasts coming to Jesus in worship with coming to Jesus in disbelief. We must make a choice, because the outcome of our Jesus-encounter is dependent on the orientation of the heart. Either we delight in his love for us, or we reject him as God and savior. Was there a time in your life where you faced this cross-road before? How are you responding to Jesus today?
